MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE VISTA IRRIGATION DISTRICT

February 5, 2014

A Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors of Vista Irrigation District was held on Wednesday, February 5, 2014, at the offices of the District, 1391 Engineer Street, Vista, California.

1. CALL TO ORDER

President Dorey called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m.

2. ROLL CALL

Directors present: Miller, Vásquez, Dorey, Franklin, and MacKenzie.

Directors absent: None.

Staff present: Roy Coox, General Manager; Lisa Soto, Secretary of the Board; Eldon Boone, Assistant General Manager; Don Smith, Director of Water Resources; Brian Smith, Director of Engineering; Dan Dambach, Field Services Manager; Al Ducusin, Engineering Manager; Marlene Kelleher, Finance Manager; Farrokh Shahamiri, Finance Associate; and Brett Hodgkiss, Administrative Services Manager. General Counsel Joel Kuperberg was also present.

Other attendees: None.

3. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Director Miller led the pledge of allegiance.

4. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Upon motion by Director MacKenzie, seconded by Director Miller and unanimously carried (5 ayes: Miller, Vásquez, Franklin, MacKenzie, and Dorey), the Board of Directors approved the agenda as presented.

5. PUBLIC COMMENT TIME

No public comments were presented on items not appearing on the agenda.

6. CONSENT CALENDAR

Director Vásquez inquired about a payment made to Packard Government Affairs. General Manager Roy Coox responded that this payment was part of the new agreement authorized by the Board in November with a not-to-exceed amount of \$15,000. Mr. Coox said that a small portion of the not-to-exceed amount on the new agreement still remains unspent at this time.

14-02-13 Upon motion by Director MacKenzie, seconded by Director Vásquez and unanimously carried (5 ayes: Miller, Vásquez, Franklin, MacKenzie, and Dorey), the Board of Directors approved the Consent Calendar, including Resolution No. 14-04 approving disbursements.

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7. DIVISION REPORTS

See staff report attached hereto.

Director of Water Resources Don Smith responded to an inquiry about feral pig activity on the Warner Ranch stating that there has been none in recent months.

Mr. Coox updated the Board on the status of the reclaimed water project with the City of Carlsbad (Carlsbad) and the City of Oceanside (Oceanside) stating that District staff has been developing a cost proposal for the purchase of the reclaimed water from Carlsbad. Mr. Coox said that the proposal is now being reviewed by Oceanside before being presented to Carlsbad.

Mr. Don Smith updated the Board regarding a permit issued to Project Wildlife for the release of up to eight raccoons on the Warner Ranch. Mr. Smith said that Project Wildlife is an organization which takes in young raccoons that have been separated from their parents and raises them to the point in which they can be released back into the wild. Mr. Smith added that this is only the third time in the past 13 years that this organization has requested to release raccoons onto the Warner Ranch.

8. 2014 WATER BOND

See staff report attached hereto.

Mr. Coox stated that this item was brought forth at the request of the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA). ACWA requested that member agencies send a letter of opposition regarding Senate Bill 848 (Wolk), the Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Flood Protection Act of 2014. Mr. Coox said that when staff researched the matter, several similar but competing bills were found in progress, as well as a proposal by ACWA. Administrative Services Manager Brett Hodgkiss presented an overview of the bills stating that existing law created the Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Act of 2012, which if approved by voters this November, will authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$11.14 billion to finance safe drinking water and water supply reliability programs. Senate Bill 40, which is currently in the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee, proposes to change the name of the act to the Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Act of 2014.

Mr. Hodgkiss said that ACWA has informed its members that Senate Bill 848 would repeal the provisions of the 2012 bond act and it would authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$6.475 billion to finance safe drinking water, water quality and flood protection programs. ACWA has requested that its members oppose the bill because it would reduce funding for water storage and Delta sustainability when compared to other bond proposals. The Board discussed the matter and decided to wait and see how this matter develops before taking an official position on any legislation.

14-02-14 Upon motion by Director MacKenzie, seconded by Director Franklin and unanimously carried (5 ayes: Miller, Vásquez, Franklin, MacKenzie, and Dorey), the Board of Directors continued discussion to the next Board meeting regarding Senate Bill 848 (Wolk), known as the Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Flood Protection Act of 2014.

9. LAKE HANSHAW/WARNER RANCH INSPECTION TOUR

The Board discussed dates for the Board Inspection Tour of District facilities at Lake Henshaw and the Warner Ranch, and decided on Monday, April 14, 2014. The Board briefly discussed possible agenda items for the tour which may include a possible tour of the improvements being made by the new owners of the Warner Springs Ranch Resort adjacent to the Warner Ranch property.

10. MATTERS PERTAINING TO THE ACTIVITIES OF THE SAN DIEGO COUNTY WATER AUTHORITY

See staff report attached hereto.

Director Miller reported that the Water Authority Board adopted a resolution authorizing the General Manager to submit and administer application for Proposition 50 desalination grant funding. The Board also approved a contract for extended construction management services for the San Vicente Dam Raise and Carryover Storage project due to significant delays in project completion. Director Miller said that the Water Authority Board discussed rate structures related to treated and untreated water and water from the desalination plant once it is completed.

The Board entered into a brief discussion about the Water Authority's "reliability charges". Assistant General Manager Eldon Boone said that the reliability charges have not yet been determined, but a policy decision has been made by the Water Authority to charge more to agencies with variable usage, of which there are seven including VID. Mr. Boone explained that according to the Water Authority, agencies with their own local water supplies hurt reliability because they use their own water first, and water provided by the Water Authority second when needed. Mr. Boone stated that agencies in this group will pay a higher reliability charge based their highest demand in the previous 10 years. Mr. Boone stated that still being discussed by the Water Authority is how agencies which improve reliability by bringing online new uninterruptible sources of water will be rewarded. Mr. Boone noted as an interesting side-note that the Water Authority is projecting its sales to decrease over the next 30 years due to conservation, increased water pricing, and additional new uninterruptible and independent water supplies which are being added to the Region by some of the water agencies.

Mr. Brian Smith left the meeting following the above discussion.

11. REPORTS ON MEETINGS AND EVENTS ATTENDED BY DIRECTORS, AND AUTHORIZATION FOR DIRECTOR ATTENDANCE AT UPCOMING MEETINGS AND EVENTS

Director Franklin reported on his attendance at a meeting regarding the San Luis Rey Indian Water Rights Settlement which he commented was quite educational and provided him with a new perspective on the current state of negotiations. Director Franklin said that he also attended an interesting meeting with two people from the Rancho Santa Margarita Water District, one of whom like Director Franklin is newly appointed to the ACWA Federal Affairs Committee. Director Franklin said that he found this meeting enlightening as to the current goals and legislative agenda of the ACWA Federal Affairs Committee.

Director Vásquez reported that he attended the Sexual Harassment Training provided on-site at the District headquarters which he said was very well done, and enjoyable. Director Vásquez reported that he also attended a meeting of the San Diego North Economic Development Council meeting where the presentation was an update on the Bay Delta Conservation Plan.

Director Vásquez reported that he attended a meeting of the ACWA Region 10 Board of Directors in Carlsbad where the Board discussed and settled on the calendar for 2014. Director Vásquez reported that the Region 10 Board is planning to host a special presentation in October 2014, the topic for which will be determined later. The Region 10 Board appointed committee reporters, and discussed how to get more representation from the San Diego area on the Region 10 Board.

Director MacKenzie reported on her attendance at the CSDA Finance Corp. meeting. It was noted in the meeting that fewer financings were done by the Finance Corp. in the previous year, presumably due to the still struggling economy. Director MacKenzie reported on a meeting she attended with the Liaison to the ACWA Local Government Committee, of which Director MacKenzie is Chair, to discuss plans for the Committee in 2014. Director MacKenzie said that she has planned a meeting of the whole for later in the month to discuss the matters on which the Committee will focus its attention in 2014. Director MacKenzie reported that she also attended a meeting of the CSDA Board of Directors.

Director MacKenzie reported on her attendance at the City of Vista's "State of the City" Luncheon, which she noted was well attended, and where a status report for the City was presented. Director MacKenzie said that Mayor Ritter noted in her comments that over 1,000 apartment units have been approved for construction in the City of Vista.

Director MacKenzie reported that she attended an ACWA workshop and strategic planning session the previous Thursday, and an ACWA Board of Directors meeting the following day. Director MacKenzie noted that the Executive Committee election was conducted, and Gary Arant of Valley Center Municipal Water District was elected to the Executive Committee, and Peer Swan was not reelected to the Executive Committee.

Director MacKenzie stated that she was informed that as Chair of the Local Government Committee, it is strongly suggested that she attend the ACWA Legislative Symposium on March 5. Director MacKenzie added that she also brought back information for Director Franklin regarding the ACWA Conference in Washington DC because she learned that members of the Federal Affairs Committee are strongly encouraged to attend this conference. Director Franklin responded that being away from his business for a week would be difficult for him, but he would be willing to go in the interest of representing the District and building relationships for the District in Washington DC. He asked for the consensus of the Board as to whether it would be a worthwhile expenditure of District funds. Director MacKenzie expressed her support for Director Franklin going to see for himself if there is value in attending this conference in the future. President Dorey said since Director Franklin requested to be appointed to the ACWA Federal Affairs Committee, he believed a good faith effort to fulfill his role on the Committee would be appropriate. Director Franklin agreed, adding that he wants to be active on the Committee while at the same time being respectful of the ratepayer's resources.

Director MacKenzie reported that she attended a meeting of the Local Agencies Formation Commission (LAFCO) where a couple of annexation proposals were discussed which would affect VID. One is for 300 acres north of the City of Vista, and the other is at the terminus of Las Posas Road. She suggested that staff keep an eye on these proposed annexations as they progress.

Director Miller reported that he attended a meeting of the Water Authority's San Vicente Power Plant Committee. Director Miller said that the movement towards the development of a power agreement in connection with the San Vicente dam raise is becoming more of a reality. Director Miller reported that he also attended a recent San Luis Rey Indian Water Settlement meeting, a meeting of the Indian Settlement Principals, and a related conference call.

President Dorey reported that he attended a meeting of the Southern California Water Committee in the City of Burbank where the discussion centered on the California Water Action Plan. The guest speaker on the subject was Assembly member Mike Gatto, and there was also a panel discussion on the same subject. Director Dorey reported that he also attended a meeting of the San Luis Rey Watershed Council. Director Dorey reported that he would be attending a meeting of the ACWA Groundwater Committee meeting the following day.

Director MacKenzie and President Dorey requested to attend the ACWA Spring Conference in Monterey, May 6-9, 2014. Director MacKenzie requested authorization to attend the CSDA Legislative Days in Sacramento, May 20-21, 2014, and the ACWA Legislative Symposium March 5 in Sacramento. Director MacKenzie noted that March 5 is a VID Board meeting date, and she asked that her absence at the VID Board meeting be excused so she can attend ACWA Legislative Symposium. Director Miller requested to attend the Council of Water Utilities (COWU) on February 18, 2014, and Director Vásquez and President Dorey indicated that they too would be attending COWU on February 18. Director Franklin requested to attend the ACWA Conference in Washington DC, February 25-27, 2014.

14-02-16 Upon motion by Director Miller, seconded by Director Vásquez and unanimously carried (5 ayes: Miller, Vásquez, Franklin, MacKenzie, and Dorey), the Board of Directors authorized the following Director attendances: MacKenzie and Dorey to the ACWA Spring Conference in Monterey, May 6-9; MacKenzie to the CSDA Legislative Days in Sacramento, May 20-21; MacKenzie to the ACWA Legislative Symposium March 5 in Sacramento; Miller to attend COWU on February 18; and Franklin to attend the ACWA Conference in Washington DC, February 25-27, 2014.

12. ITEMS FOR FUTURE AGENDAS AND/OR PRESS RELEASES

See staff report attached hereto.

Director MacKenzie asked when the Water Supply Response Program might be presented to the Board following its presentation to the Water Sustainability Committee (WS Committee). She indicated that she believed an in-depth discussion on this matter with the full Board's participation would be appropriate. Mr. Coox responded that staff has discussed with Chair Vásquez the scheduling of the WS Committee meeting to take place after a presentation on the drought by the Water Authority on February 18. Mr. Coox said that it would be good to know the Water Authority's official position first, adding that things are changing quickly right now. Mr. Coox said that the District is always at least at Water Supply Response Level 1, which requires customers to comply with certain conservation measures even during non-drought times. Mr. Coox said that staff is waiting to see if there will be any additional conservation requirements imposed regionally, or any cutbacks. Director MacKenzie suggested that the WS Committee discuss how to best communicate a renewed conservation message to the District's customers and inform them about the District's current Water Supply Response Level and what it means. Administrative Services Manager Brett Hodgkiss reviewed what is already being done to communicate this message to the District's customers. Mr. Hodgkiss said that staff has prepared a draft newsletter to be reviewed by the Public Affairs Committee (PA Committee), which will lay out the current water supply conditions and advise customers of the District's Drought Response Program and its requirements. Director MacKenzie further suggested that the PA Committee discuss the possibility of resuming Public Service Announcements at the local movie theater.

13. COMMENTS BY DIRECTORS

Director Vásquez commented on a conservation themed commercial sponsored by Verizon about the installation of water sensors for efficient water use by farmers. He also commented on an editorial article about the worsening drought and the level of conservation efforts in Northern California versus conservation efforts in Southern California. The Board discussed the drought and ideas for inspiring people to conserve. The Board noted that a large percentage of Vista's population resides in apartments where there is one master meter. It was presumed that since apartment dwellers have no means of measuring their water usage, they have little incentive to conserve. President Dorey said that he believed that the vast majority of the water usage in an apartment complex is not attributable to the residents, but to

the landscaping put in place in compliance with City ordinances. He suggested that the Water Sustainability and/or the Public Affairs Committees discuss this and develop ideas for outreach to apartment complex management promoting water conservation.

Director Miller reported that he received notification from the Water Authority that the Metropolitan Water District (MWD) is already discussing rates for 2015 and 2016, which are projected to be increased by 1.5% per year. Director Miller said that there was a discussion at the San Diego Association of Governments (SanDAG) about the MWD rate stabilization fund, which is projected to reach \$800 million this year. Director Miller noted that this is \$320 million above MWD's stated maximum reserve limit. Director Miller said that since MWD is not proposing any changes to its property tax collection, it would appear that MWD's reserve fund will continue to increase. Director Miller said that 14 mayors, including Mayor Ritter of Vista, have collaborated on a letter to other mayors encouraging them all to voice complaints about MWD continuing to add to its reserves while also continuing to raise rates and collect property taxes. The Board discussed this matter briefly. President Dorey suggested that Director Miller share whatever information he has on the MWD rate increase with General Manager Coox.

Director Miller reported on the Colorado River reservoirs which are less than half full. Director Miller said that levels are so low that it has been proposed to cut back 750,000 acre feet of the water that would normally go from Lake Powell to Lake Mead. Director Miller said that it is projected that by 2016 if conditions do not improve, there will be a water crisis in Las Vegas and the Central Valley Project in Arizona. Director Miller also commented on reports that in the midst of the drought there are increasing comments coming out of Northern California that Southern California should consider sharing some of its emergency reserve water with the North. Director Miller said that he believes that this is a conversation that is gaining traction and in the next few months it may become a big issue.

14. COMMENTS BY GENERAL COUNSEL

None were presented.

15. COMMENTS BY GENERAL MANAGER

Mr. Coox informed the Board that a flyer was received regarding a retirement celebration for Rita Schmidt Sudman of the Water Education Foundation. He noted that the celebration will be in Sacramento on March 26. He said that while the District does not have any provisions to pay for attendance at such events, he would be happy to share the information with any Director who might be in the Sacramento area at that time who may wish to attend.

Mr. Coox reported that the District is close to reaching a final resolution in the Temporary Service Agreement matter with Mr. and Mrs. Qiu discussed at the previous Board meeting. Mr. Coox said that a letter was sent by President Dorey to the couple, and they have now proposed a payment plan which will include three installments to be paid over the course of the next year. Mr. Coox said that staff is calculating the payments to include interest, and he believes the matter will soon be put to rest. The Board asked staff to include a provision in the agreement stating that any default in payments will result in the full amount becoming due and payable in 30 days, and failure to pay will result in a discontinuation of water service on the property. Director MacKenzie suggested that this clause be **bolded** in the agreement.

Mr. Coox reported that the water level at Lake Henshaw was currently at 4,000 acre feet.

A brief break was then taken from 10:46 a.m. to 10:59 a.m. Upon return from break, present in the audience were Don Smith and Brian Smith. President Dorey announced that during the break he was

alerted by the Secretary that there are conflicting reports regarding his appointment to the ACWA Groundwater Committee for 2014. He asked that the Board revisit Item 11, and provide authorization for his attendance at the ACWA Groundwater Committee meeting in Sacrament the following day, at which time he will endeavor to straighten out the matter.

11. REPORTS ON MEETINGS AND EVENTS ATTENDED BY DIRECTORS, AND AUTHORIZATION FOR DIRECTOR ATTENDANCE AT UPCOMING MEETINGS AND EVENTS

14-02-17 Upon motion by Director MacKenzie, seconded by Director Miller and unanimously carried (5 ayes: Miller, Vásquez, Franklin, MacKenzie, and Dorey), the Board of Directors authorized President Dorey to attend the ACWA Groundwater Committee meeting in Sacramento on February 6, 2014.

16. CLOSED SESSION FOR CONFERENCE WITH LEGAL COUNSEL

President Dorey adjourned the meeting to closed session at 11:01 a.m. for a conference with legal counsel per Paragraph (1) of subdivision (d) of Government Code section 54956.9 to discuss the following pending litigation:

- B. San Luis Rey Indian Water Rights Litigation (Settlement)
- C. Quantification Settlement Agreement (QSA)

The meeting reconvened in open session at 12:18 p.m. President Dorey declared that no reportable action had been taken.

STAFF REPORT

SUBJECT: ACWA/JPIA PRESIDENT'S SPECIAL RECOGNITION AWARD

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: For information only.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION: None.

FISCAL IMPACT: None.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: Vista Irrigation District was recently presented the President's Special Recognition Award from ACWA/JPIA.

<u>DETAILED REPORT</u>: The ACWA/JPIA President's Special Recognition Award acknowledges the District's efforts in maintaining our low loss ratio in the JPIA's Property Program for the annual policy periods of 2009 to 2012. This award was achieved by maintaining a low ratio of paid claims and case reserves (total incurred costs) to deposit premiums.

The award for the Property Program recognizes that, for the period of 2009 to 2012, the District did not submit a single claim for the replacement of damaged property (real or personal property). This record is noteworthy as VID currently carries \$26.7 million in insurance coverage for assets including but not limited to; buildings, reservoirs, vehicles, heavy equipment, computers, SCADA instrumentation, solar panels etc. Additionally, Lake Henshaw assets include the dam, various pumps and motors on the well field and the historical Warner-Carrillo Ranch House and barn.

Moreover, the receipt of this award is an acknowledgment that the District, with assistance from ACWA/JPIA staff, is continuing its efforts to proactively limit its exposure to property claims. These coordinated activities, coupled with an actively involved and dedicated workforce, have resulted in a favorable loss to premium ratio. As a result, associated property premium costs have remained low.

SUBJECT: TREASURER'S REPORT AS OF DECEMBER 31, 2013

<u>RECOMMENDATION:</u> Informational report concerning the investments of the District.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: Attached for review by the Board of Directors is the Treasurer's Report as of December 31, 2013. The report is formatted to provide information as required by the California Government Code and the Vista Irrigation District Investment Policy. The Treasurer's Report contains both an investment summary and a detailed security listing. Also attached is a five-year cash flow forecast, which indicates the District's investments are sufficiently liquid to meet anticipated cash flow needs.

<u>DETAILED REPORT</u>: Activity for the quarter included deposits and withdrawals from the District's cash and cash equivalent accounts: checking, California Asset Management Program (CAMP), and Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF). During the quarter, \$3 million of Treasury bills matured and \$3 million of new Treasury bills were purchased.

As of December 31, 2013, the net unrealized gain on the portfolio was as follows:



SUMMARY: Previous month's and anticipated activities are reported by each division.

ADMINISTRATION AND FIELD SERVICES DIVISION

January

- For the twelve months ended December 31, 2013, the District's conservation rate was 20.8%, which exceeds its 20 X 2020 conservation targets for 2015 and 2020.
- Delivered 2014 Water Awareness Calendars to fourth grade classes. Invited teachers to schedule a classroom presentation regarding the upcoming poster contest.
- Coordinated training on job based harassment for all employees (January 23). This was a two part course that is AB 1825 compliant for managers and supervisors. Gordon Graham provided the training.
- Hosted Liebert Cassidy Whitmore labor law workshops on "Difficult Conversations" and "Front Line Defense". These workshops were attended by other water districts.
- Continued recruitment for Welder II position.
- Completed main line installation on Foothill Drive 4,300 feet of 6", 8" and 10" pipe with 21 service outlets and 5 fire hydrants.
- Removed and replaced five Flume transition covers.
- Installed 18" valve and vault at MD Reservoir.
- Began main line installation on Hilo Drive 750 feet of 8" pipe.
- Began main line installation on N. Santa Fe and Washington Street 500 feet of 8" pipe.

- The County has approved a Major Use Permit for a new cellular telecommunications tower on the Warner Ranch near Lake Henshaw Resort. The District is negotiating final terms of a telecommunications license agreement with AT&T for the site.

What is a steelhead trout?




- Anadromous, or ocean going form, of the Pacific salmon species Oncorhynchus mykiss
- Freshwater resident form is known as the rainbow trout




- Popular sportfish














Relicensing of FERC Project 176



NMFS Responds to Applicants' Initial Consultation Package for Conduit Exemption and Surrender

Applicants should perform the following studies:

- Water balance / operations model study
- Water temperature model / monitoring study
- Steelhead habitat assessment study
- · Steelhead flow requirements study
- Steelhead migration impediment assessment study
- Steelhead genetics sampling study

Information from these studies will shape future requirements, to include:

- Periodic pulse flows for steelhead migrations
- Steelhead collection and transport [fish passage] around/past project facilities
- Stream-flow barrier removals and stream restoration actions in the watershed(s)
 - Removal of permanent or low-flow barriers
 - Eradication invasive, non-native, riparian plants and replanting with native riparian plants
 - Placement of woody debris and/or steelhead spawning-sized gravels
 - monitoring of adult and juvenile steelhead within the mainstem and major tributaries
 - Participation in or funding of estuarine restorations actions
 - Development of potential future conservation hatcheries, etc.



Proposed WR-34 Hydroelectric Power Generation Facility



- WR-34 releases imported raw water into the SMR
- RCWD prepared 50% design and FERC Initial Consultation Package
- NMFS requested Section
 7 consultation
- RCWD suspended project over concern regarding undefined fiscal exposure



NMFS objects to potential adverse impacts of project on Southern steelhead by:

- Reducing the amount and quality of spawning and rearing habitat;
- Reducing upstream and downstream passage opportunities for adults, juveniles, and smolts; and
- ➤ Interfering with the channel forming flows that form critical habitat features in streams.

NMFS suggest requirements that applicants:

- ➤ Prepare a "Water Supply Report"
- ➤ Prepare a "Cumulative Diversion Analysis"
- ➤ Conduct a "Site Specific Flow Study"
- Establish diversion limits based on season, minimum bypass flow, water temperature, and maximum cumulative diversion rate
- ➤ Provide for fish passage
- Monitor streamflow conditions

Santa Margarita River Conjunctive Use Project

- ➤ As the Federal Member of the project team, USMC Camp Pendleton is taking lead on consultation with NMFS
- Approach to addressing NMFS' concerns is still in development

NMFS in Action: 3 local examples

- Relicensing of FERC Project 176 (VID & City of Escondido)
 - Applicants surrendered FERC license in favor of conduit exemption
- Proposed WR-34 Hydroelectric Power Generation Facility (RCWD)
 - Project suspended
- Santa Margarita River Conjunctive Use Project (FPUD & USMC)
 - Outcome undetermined

Take home lessons

- Significant tangible benefits of local water projects are being exchanged for the speculative, marginal, and costly benefits associated with attempted Southern steelhead recovery.
- Attempts to recover Southern steelhead will compromise aquatic species in the California delta and Colorado River basins.

Threats to SoCal Water Supplies Related to Anadromous Fish:

- WHY DO WE CARE ABOUT STEELHEAD?
- Sections 4(f), 7, 9 and 10 of the Endangered Species Act, and the California Endangered Species Act (CESA)
- Steelhead Recovery Plan and Implementation
 - Non-Binding. See Friends of Blackwater v. Salazar, 691 F.3d 428, 435 (D.C. Cir. 2012).
 - Thus, implications through CEQA, SWRCB Petitions/Applications, FERC actions; 401 Certifications.
 - Important to remind NOAA Fisheries that methodology and targets in Recovery Plan are ASPIRATIONAL, NOT REGULATORY.

Threats to SoCal Water Supplies Related to Anadromous Fish:

- Critical Habitat Designations--REGULATORY
 - Critical Habitat is Regulatory. Destroying Critical Habitat potentially Triggers Section 7 Consultation under ESA if there is a federal hook to project.
 - Santa Ana Sucker example
- Federal Actions and Section 7 Consultations:
 - Action must not adversely affect T/E Species or critical habitat
 - Camp Pendleton, RCWD projects both ran into Section 7
- SWRCB Flow Criteria for every river in state by 2019
 - Already fighting over this in the San Joaquin. Senior nonappropriative water rights potentially giving way to flow criteria utilizing Article X, Section 2 of CA Constitution and Public Trust

Threats to SoCal Water Supplies Related to Anadromous Fish:

- CDFG—Streambed Alteration Agreements and Requirements for Flow
 - Siskiyou County Litigation
 - Recent decision—opening headgates and other diversion facilities does not trigger 1602.
 - Unanswered question—can DFG nevertheless mandate certain flows as part of 1602 permitting process?
 - CDFW filed notice of appeal on May 13, 2013
- 303(d) Listings and Development of TMDLs

Possible Water Community Response

- De Facto Current Approach: Stay quiet, keep good records, achieve greater water efficiency, use more recycled water, and litigate when/if needed.
 - Reactive but potentially cheaper.
 - Perhaps greater long term risk to local supply.
- Proactive Engagement could also include:
 - Oppose critical habitat designations and support those involved in disputes with NOAA Fisheries and/or CDFW
 - Develop regional special studies to show: lack of presence of species, methodology in classifying sub-species is flawed; key assumptions in recovery plan are flawed (recovery metrics, eco-regions
 - Attend meetings re steelhead with NGOs—allows you to both assess risks and collaborative opportunities (remember NGOs are generally well meaning people too—just with different priorities)
 - Be prepared to deal with Steelhead in CEQA documentation

Possible Water Community Response

- Proactive Engagement could also include (continued):
 - Develop 7(a) (1) Projects to Benefit Steelhead and Other Species; and/or
 - Develop Regional or Watershed Based HCPs
 - HCPs rare for NOAA Fisheries; SD Region would be the guinea pigs if done on a large scale.
 - Costly/cumbersome upfront; can yield future certainty & safe harbor
 - · Get ahead of 2019 in-stream flow criteria and future TMDLs
 - Collaboratively develop IRWM Projects on watershed basis
 - · Get buy in from NGOs, and develop trust



STAFF REPORT

SUBJECT: 2014 WATER BOND

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Consider the Association of California Water Agencies' request to send a letter of opposition to Senate Bill 848 (Wolk), known as the Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Flood Protection Act of 2014, to the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION: None.

FISCAL IMPACT: None.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: Existing law created the Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Act of 2012, which authorizes the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$11.14 billion to finance safe drinking water and water supply reliability programs, if approved by the voters at the November 4, 2014 statewide general election. Senate Bill 40, which is currently in the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee, would change the name of the act to the Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Act of 2014.

The Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) has informed its members that Senator Lois Wolk has introduced Senate Bill 848, the Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Flood Protection Act of 2014. This measure would repeal the provisions of the 2012 bond act and authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$6.475 billion to finance safe drinking water, water quality and flood protection programs. ACWA is requesting that its members send a letter of opposition to this bill to the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee. ACWA states that it opposes Senate Bill 848 because it would reduce funding for water storage and Delta sustainability (when compared to other bond proposals).

<u>DETAILED REPORT</u>: In November 2009, the Governor and state lawmakers crafted a plan to meet the California's growing water challenges. The plan consisted of four policy bills and an \$11.14 billion bond. The package established the Delta Stewardship Council, set ambitious water conservation policy, ensured better groundwater monitoring and provided funding for the State Water Resources Control Board for increased enforcement of illegal water diversions. The original bond act, known was the Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Act, was not placed on the general statewide election ballot in 2010 or 2012. Senate Bill 40, introduced by Senator Fran Pavley, would change the name of the bond act to the Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Act of 2014. If the bill passes, the bond act would be submitted to the voters at the November 4, 2014 statewide general election, and if approved, would provide funding for water supply reliability (\$1.4 billion), Delta sustainability (\$2.25 billion), statewide water system operational improvements (\$3 billion), conservation and watershed protection (\$1.785 billion), groundwater protection and water quality (\$1 billion), water recycling (\$1.25 billion) and drought relief (\$455 million).

On January 9, 2014, Senator Wolk introduced Senate Bill 848, the Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Flood Protection Act of 2014. (NOTE: This bill is similar to Senate Bill 42 which Senator Wolk introduced in December 2012.) This measure would repeal the original bond act and authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$6.475 billion to finance safe drinking water, water quality and flood protection programs. This bond proposal would provide funding in four categories: safe drinking water (\$2 billion), water quality and watershed protection (\$2.1 billion), flood control and stormwater management (\$1.375 billion) and water system operational improvements (\$1 billion).

ACWA opposes Senate Bill 848 because it "fails to provide adequate funding for storage and Delta sustainability – two areas that are critical to achieving California's coequal goals of improved water supply reliability and ecosystem health". Also, the bill does not provide for continuous appropriation for storage. For these reasons, ACWA is requesting that its members send a letter of opposition to Senate Bill 848 to Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee members.

ACWA also opposes Assembly Bill 1331, the Clean and Safe Drinking Water Act of 2014. The measure, introduced by Assembly Member Anthony Rendon on February 22, 2013, would repeal the original bond act and authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$6.5 billion to finance water supply and protection facilities and programs. This bond proposal would provide funding in four categories: clean and safe drinking water (\$1 billion), protecting rivers, lakes, streams, coastal waters and watersheds (\$1.5 billion), climate change preparedness for regional water security (\$1.5 billion), Delta sustainability (\$1 billion) and water storage for climate change (\$1.5 billion). This bill has passed out of the Assembly and has been referred to the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee.

ACWA supports a downsized 2014 Water Bond that protects key statewide priority areas and still retains significant funding for other important categories (such as disadvantaged communities, Integrated Regional Water Management Plans, groundwater quality, recycling and conservation and watersheds). To this end, ACWA has developed an \$8.2 billion bond proposal that focuses on key statewide priority areas and maintains significant funding for local water resources development and other projects. Attached is a summary of ACWA's modified bond proposal.

Currently, there are four water bond bills that have been referred to the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee. As of the writing of this report, Senate Bill 40 (Pavley) and Assembly Bill 1331 (Rendon) had not been scheduled for hearing. Senate Bill 42 (Wolk) was scheduled for hearing on January 7, 2014 but was postponed. Senate Bill 848 (Wolk) is scheduled to be heard on February 11, 2014.

In deciding whether to take a position, the District should consider among other things, the programs that would be funded, the differences in funding levels and the likelihood of voters statewide supporting each of the proposals. The attached table provides general comparisons of each proposal's components.


